

- National Guard, teamed with local volunteers and assisted in 'drying-in' homes and debris removal in the Columbia area.
- In 1992 when Hurricane Andrew hit South Florida, CCA volunteer work teams coordinated the military and civilian volunteers in the dry-in efforts. Thousands of individuals received services from CCA members ranging from food and building materials distributed from the Homestead Emergency Operation Center. Over 500 homes received visqueen "dry-ins" and tree and debris clean up. In the months after the storm, un-met needs and special cases were resolved for elderly, disabled or uninsured individuals ranging from roof work to complete rebuilds; all at no cost to the survivor.
- In 1996 when the Delaware River flooded the lower valley of Bucks County, Pennsylvania, CCA teams were one among the first voluntary teams in to help evacuate families and provide debris removal and rebuilding services.
- In 1998, when tornadoes devastated Central Florida, CCA teams responded in concert with the State Emergency Response Team by coordinating the distribution of State owned visqueen. CCA, with the direction of local officials, responded promptly with assessment teams to all affected areas. CCA created a priority list of most urgent needs and immediately acted on these needs by first qualifying all volunteers and placing them with experienced disaster relief team leaders. This effort provided effective and efficient emergency 'dry-in' services to nearly 400 families. CCA remained in the area for nearly 18 months to continue free professional services for special needs and uninsured individuals.
- Also in 1998, after CCA's efforts to help families that were affected by wildfires, Hurricane George made landfall in the Florida Keys. CCA teams immediately responded to assess damage and to prevent further destruction from approaching rainstorms. As requested by SERT and ESF-15, CCA were the first to meet State trucks providing ice, visqueen, and other 'dry-in' materials. CCA managed and coordinated all distribution of visqueen to pre-qualified families in need. Additionally, CCA assisted over 125 families with 'dry-in' services and tree and debris removal.
- In 2000, CCA responded to the South Florida Floods by assisting in debris removal and clean up activities. In December of that same year, CCA responded to the tornadoes that touched down in Bonifay, Florida. With local Emergency Operation Center direction, CCA helped over 20 families that were affected by the event. Leaving Bonifay, CCA responded to Geneva, Alabama, which had a tornado touchdown in the same weather system. 35 homes received the free services of 'dry-ins', roof repairs, and tree/debris removal.

In the last month, CCA responded in Volusia County as a coordinated effort with Florida Interfaiths Networking in Disaster and Florida's Coast-to-Coast Chapter of the **American Red Cross**. All request from the County Emergency Operations Center and
